

Only Blessings
Revelation 22:1-5

1. You've been invited to introduce "River of Life and Tree of Life" on a travel channel. How would you describe and present this scene? In what way does this image satisfy the deep longings and needs of the human heart?
2. In verse 2, the leaves of the Tree of Life are said to be "for the healing of the nations." In a place where sickness and death no longer exist (Revelation 21:4), what deeper meaning might this "healing" have?
3. Verse 3 emphasizes that "No longer will there be any curse." Together with verse 2, what does this reveal about God's ultimate reconciliation with His creation and the restoration of all things?
4. In verses 3–4, we read that "His servants will serve Him; they will see His face." In the Old Testament, why was it impossible for anyone to see God's face (Exodus 33:18–23)? How has the cross of Jesus Christ changed that?
5. The word "serve" in the New Testament can often be understood as "worship." What is the connection between heavenly worship and "seeing His face"? How can this truth bring comfort and strength when we feel lost, lonely, or unable to perceive God's presence in our lives today?
6. In verse 5, what explanation is given about the source of "light"? How does the fact that resurrected, embodied people live in a non-material spiritual realm highlight God's grace and wonder even more?
7. Why is God's name written on His servants' foreheads? When the text says "they will reign forever and ever," how is this different from earthly concepts of kingship—such as the American "No King" protest?
8. The water of life, clear as crystal, flows "from the throne of God and of the Lamb." Does this flow symbolize a certain redemptive truth? Where can you draw from this "living water" in your life today (John 7:37–38)?
9. The Tree of Life bears twelve kinds of fruit, yielding a different crop each month. How does this describe an image of continuous, generous giving of life? How might this inspire us to live out fruitful lives that nourish others?
10. This passage ends with the words "no more night," "the Lord God will give them light," and "they will reign forever." How does this vision of light, presence, and authority transform your mindset when you face darkness, pressure, injustice, or spiritual low points today?
